## PT Corner: From the Woman Beside the Man



What is the first thing you think of when you hear the word restore? Initially I think of furniture. The act of taking that old, scratched, beat-up, water-stained piece from the attic and sanding it down and applying a new beautiful finish that restores it to its former glory. Lately, it has been more of a global thought that is triggered by the word restore. As in, three months ago the world worked one way, and now it doesn't any more. Everything has changed, and it leaves us wondering if the old ways will ever be restored. Some of the old ways should maybe go away, but it would be nice to freely hug a friend or loved one again.

The dictionary tells us Restore means to return something or someone to a former condition, place, or position. I like that definition. I am grateful for that definition. That definition of restore fills me with hope and purpose. Why? Because when I read this definition it reminds me of where we have come from, what we had, and what we lost. Remember the beginning? God created the world in a perfect state of being. He placed people in it that had not yet sinned, or experienced pain, or suffering, or shame. Those people were surrounded by beauty, abundance, and best of all, God himself walking with them and fellowshiping with them. Even with all that, discontentment happened and disobedience happened, and peace was shattered. All at once, mankind was in need of restoration. And our ever-faithful, always merciful God provided the perfect sacrifice for our sin, to redeem our fall, to restore us to fellowship with him--Jesus. **Acts 3:19-21** explains that if we confess and repent, he covers our personal restoration, but what about a global restoration? Because, as we have experienced recently, this world is still in turmoil, there is still death, still pain, still suffering. This old dented, scratched up world is far from the perfect place of beauty and peace it once was. Can we hope for all that to be restored as well? **Acts 3:19-21** also covers that. There is a time of "refreshing" coming, a time to restore all things. **1 Peter 5:10** tells us that **"Christ, will himself restore, confirm, strengthen, and establish"** us. Peter tells us that we will only suffer a little while. Other verses say the trouble is light and momentary in comparison to what is in store for the restored. Finally, **Revelation 21:1-5** encourages us with the promise that God will bring us back, or restore us to that place of no death, no tears, and no pain. He even promises us not just restoration, but to make all things new. We serve a God that goes above and beyond our expectations and imaginations (**Ephesians 3:20**).

Thank you to our merciful God for restoring our souls and crediting the righteousness of Jesus to us so that we can be restored to fellowship with you. Amen!

## Lessons from Quarantine

### Be Still

Nations are in an uproar, kingdoms are overthrown. God gives a shout, the earth dissolves. The Lord who commands armies is with us... **Be still and know that I am God.** (Psalm 46:6-10)

In January Jim and I left for Guam where Jim was teaching a class, and we spent time with our friend whose husband recently passed away. There we started hearing about Covid-19 and concerns about how easily and rapidly it was spreading and, concerns about travel. We made it safely home the end of February ... **Then all of a sudden this verse jumped off the page and into every day life.**

**"Come my people, enter your chambers and shut your doors behind you, hide yourselves for a little while until the fury has passed by."** (Isaiah 26:20)

We began seeing the news: the world was being locked down because of Covid 19... Many (even some friends) getting sick, and many people dying. My mind was filled with worries of being separated from family and friends; income challenges for so many; heartache of kids turning away from the Lord; nations warring with each other; our country being torn apart; anxiety about the economy tanking. **"BE STILL! Know that I AM GOD!"** (Psalm 46:10)

**"In the world you have trouble and suffering. But take courage—I have conquered the world. Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you; Do not let your heart be distressed or lacking in courage."** (John 16:33, 14:27)

"Be still my child. Know that I AM GOD...you are not. Your worry and fear cannot do anything about all these circumstances... it will not improve any of the distresses of this world.
